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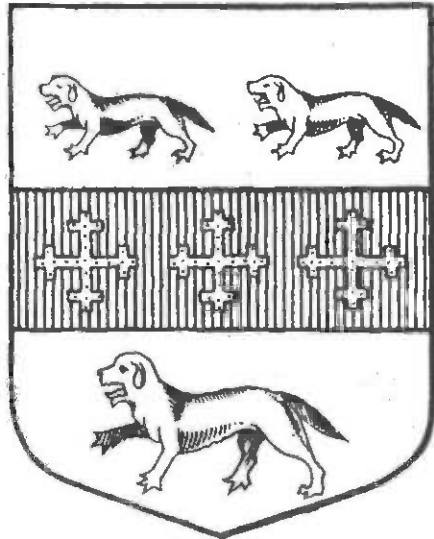

Morden

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Several years ago an interest in "who was who in our family" led to repeated correspondence with numerous members of the family in an attempt to secure detailed information about the various people whose names are, or had been, Morden. During the ensuing months and years, not only family members but also genealogists, historians, libraries, other institutions, and communities have contributed much to our fund of knowledge about the Mordens. To all of these we are grateful, for without their help we could never have compiled this work.

From several sources during the period of our research, we have heard the statement, "All who bear the name of Morden are related." More and more we are proving the seeming truth of that statement, for we are finding fewer and fewer names and families in our files that we are not able to place in their proper branch on our family tree.

Over the centuries since the Mordens first came to this "new land across the ocean" records of the families have been copied and re-copied. With the element of human error involved, it stands to reason that there are some mistakes. We have made our genealogy as accurate as we can, and apologize for any errors which appear therein. We welcome the correction of any error in order that the records may be improved for future generations.

New material is coming to us nearly every week. We have long delayed our publication of this work to try to include this new data as it arrives. We have reached the point where our decision is that we must publish, and we will reserve any further material for a supplement.

We are interested in securing for this supplement as many photographs of the Mordens as possible, or copies of the same. Any photo sent to us should have the full name of the person printed on the back. If possible include birth or death date, or husband's or wife's name, as a means of identifying correctly. This will simplify for us the identification, as so many of the names in the family have been handed down from generation to generation, not only in one line of descent, but often in several lines, first cousins often having the same given name.

Our appreciation and thanks are extended to the various members of the Morden families for information which they sent us at our request. Many sent their own direct lineage along with information about other Mordens whose connection with the family they were unable to determine. Many of these bits of seemingly inconsequential facts have been the keys which have unlocked the puzzle of placement in the family line. Some have

sent us stories of their particular family line which have been handed down to succeeding generations. Many of these are incorporated in the section "Stories and Legends from Here and There." All of these help paint pictures of "individuals" rather than just "names" on our family tree. We regret that we have been unable to secure more of these human interest stories. It is our hope that after reading this work, others will send to us stories of their own particular line as well as additional statistical material which we are lacking.

We wish to extend to Mr. T. Roy Woodhouse a very special thanks for supplying records of an earlier date than any which we had and for comparing our manuscript with his records. Mr. Woodhouse is a Registered Professional Engineer, ex-Outside Plant Engineer for the Niagara Peninsula, Bell Telephone Company of Canada. After forty-seven years' service he retired in 1956. For twenty-five years, during the time of his employment, he followed local history as a hobby. Since his retirement it has been a full time avocation. He is now ex-president of four historical societies, including the Province of Ontario Historical Society. He helped to organize the other three historical societies, plus two others in which he held no active office. At present he is tracing about 30,000 families, all in three townships. He has a record of 500 or more with the Morden name, about 350 tied in definitely in their descent. Mr. Woodhouse gave us names and dates of many of the early Morden settlers around Hamilton, Ontario. In many instances he supplied personal references, such as grants given for land received by the Mordens. This information helped very much when compared with records received from others.

Appreciation for the selection and copying of several works which are in the files of the library at the University of Toronto, Toronto, Ontario, is extended to Mr. R. Brian Land, Assistant Chief Librarian of the University. Mr. Land is an amateur historian only, having graduated from the University of Toronto in political science and economics, and in library science (B.A., M.L.S.) He is a descendant of Robert Land, through Abel Land (1760?) who was his great-great-great-grandfather. Mr. Land sent us the article which appeared in The New Dominion Monthly magazine, Prof. John M. Coleman's article, and the Morden section of Pioneer Life of the Bay of Quinte.

Our thanks also go to Professor John M. Coleman, associate professor of history at Lafayette College, Easton, Pennsylvania, for permission to use portions of his two articles which appeared in the Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography, v. 79, October 1955, and in Ontario History in 1956. THE TREASON OF RALPH MORDEN
AND ROBERT LAND

"During the American Revolution only four men were hanged for treason in the state of Pennsylvania.¹ One of these was Ralph Morden, an obscure laborer, who was executed at Easton in 1780 for helping a Tory named Robert Land jump bail and escape to Canada. The sentence against Morden was pronounced by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania and confirmed by the Supreme Executive Council. Morden did not appeal the decision or petition for clemency, and there was apparently no public outcry.

"The execution was described by Thomas Hughes, a young British officer then in Easton as a prisoner of war, who wrote in his journal on November 26, 1780: 'A man was hanged this morning for piloting some people through the back woods, to the Indians. He was very old and left a wife and 9 children. His death was chiefly owing to his being a noted friend of Government.'²

"That is all. There is no further discussion of the Morden case in Thomas Hughes's account, and there are no other contemporary references to it, except for the microscopic fragments of information that genealogists are accustomed to dredge up from old records. For one hundred and seventy-five years the case has failed to catch the attention of American historians, or even of specialists on the Loyalists in the Revolution. The local histories that touch upon it give it the briefest possible mention.³

"The story behind this incident, however, is common knowledge in Canada. Robert Land became the first settler on the site of Hamilton, Ontario, and Morden's widow, Ann Durham Morden, was the first settler on the site of Dundas, Ontario. Legendary accounts of the wartime activities of the Morden and Land families, both large families, have made their names prominent in Canadian folklore. These Pennsylvanians, so little known at home, are revered in Canada as Founding Fathers.⁴ Nevertheless, until recently there has been no serious effort to check the legends against available contemporary records.

"The facts at hand concerning Ralph Morden are relatively few. He was born in England in 1742, and at the time of his execution in 1780 was just thirty-eight years of age, not, as Thomas Hughes reported him, 'very old,' after all. He was the fourth son of George Morden, who emigrated with his family to Philadelphia sometime before 1750.⁵ The family was inconspicuous, and left behind almost no records. Practically all that is known is that George Morden obtained twenty acres of land in Northampton County on the Delaware River in 1753, and fifty acres in 1755.⁶

"Family tradition holds that the Mordens first settled about forty miles north of Philadelphia in New Jersey, rather than in Pennsylvania. Perhaps they did. But they were soon situated in Mt. Bethel Township in the newly created Northampton County, Pennsylvania, in a frontier region about sixty-five miles from Philadelphia, where they were assessed for land taxes.⁷ Mt. Bethel was located at the foot of the Kittatinny Ridge, with a close view of the Delaware Water Gap, a dozen miles up the Delaware River from the countyseat of Easton.

"In 1765, Ralph Morden married a New Jersey girl named Ann Durham. Although tradition refers to Ann as Irish, her family probably was one of the many English Quaker families which had sought sanctuary in Ireland, and had later removed

to New Jersey.⁸ In any case, Ann was definitely a Quaker, and Ralph Morden very possibly became a Quaker through her. Of all the Mordens in his generation he was the only known representative of that Society....

⁸Between 1766 and 1779 Ralph and Ann Morden had eight children, all of whom were brought up as Quakers, though not necessarily as pacifists.⁹ Two of them took the Patriot side in the war, while the remaining six went to Canada with their mother after the war was over. Three of Ralph Morden's younger brothers served actively with the Loyalist forces--Moses Morden as a noncommissioned officer in a corps of New Jersey Volunteers, and Joseph and Daniel in Sir John Johnson's New York Loyalist regiment.¹⁰

¹⁰On May 12, 1780, Ralph Morden was caught red-handed in what appeared to be a treasonable enterprise--helping Robert Land, an 'old offender,' to flee the country.¹² It is improbable, however, that either Morden or his captors expected at the time of his capture that he would be hanged for his offense. All the traditional accounts by either the Mordens or the Lands state that Morden gave himself up voluntarily, although it was late in the day when they were surprised and he might have taken to his heels and escaped as Land did. Un-

fortunately, Land's long record of service to the British now counted heavily against Morden, who was in greater danger than he realized....

"There are many versions of these legends, but this in general is their story. In the autumn of 1778 (some accounts say 1777) Land and two brothers named Faulkner had been busy commandeering horses, without permission of their owners, for the use of British troops in the Delaware Valley, and their Indian allies. In reprisal, the Land homestead had been visited at night and burned by Patriots, disguised as Indians, from the New York side of the river. Mrs. Land and six children escaped by minutes only, through the warning of a friendly Indian.

"Robert Land, the story continues, arriving home shortly afterward, found his house in ashes and the livestock slaughtered, and concluded that his wife and all the children who had been with her were dead. He therefore determined to flee to Canada, and went to Mt. Bethel to seek the aid of his friend, Ralph Morden. Traditionally, Land and his wife remained separated for ten or more years, each convinced that the other was dead.

"Up to this point, most of this doleful but appealing story is probably not true.¹³ The narrative then goes on to tell how Land secured Morden's aid in guiding him and the Faulkners to an unguarded 'Indian Ladder' over the Kittatinny Ridge and into the Poconos, through which they could escape.¹⁴ When they arrived at the rendezvous, instead of meeting the Faulkners, Land and Morden found American guards who had been treacherously warned, they believed, by the Faulkners. Morden gave himself up. Land escaped through the woods amid a shower of bullets, wounded and losing so much blood that the American guards and Morden were convinced that he would die....

"Ralph Morden, meanwhile, found himself a prisoner in the Easton jail where Robert Land had previously spent so many months. His trial was a fair one, contrary to the tradition that he was 'hanged out of hand.'¹⁵ The case was, indeed, heard before the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, sitting at Easton as a Court of Oyer and Terminer and General Gaol Delivery.

"Morden was charged with being a British spy, and with being on a mission to incite the Indians to attack the settlers. His defense, according to tradition, was that he was a Quaker and had merely been trying to save a life. He said that his relationship with both sides in the seesaw war had been confined to acts of mercy and kindness. He seems to have thought that the charges against him were false and could not be proved. Unfortunately, the specific evidence produced in court is no longer available, though it is recorded that he pleaded not guilty.¹⁶ The most damning circumstance apparently was that he had on his person when captured a letter of protection, or pass, from the British. The presiding judge's brief commentary on the case related only to Morden's treason for allegedly joining the Indians.¹⁷

"The transcript of conviction is not too enlightening. It is similar to the transcripts of other treason trials and is little more than a routine form. Greatly abbreviated, it states that Ralph Morden did 'maliciously and traiterously with a great number of Traitors and Rebels (whose names are as yet unknown to the Jurors) being armed and arrayed in a hostile manner with force and arms did falsely and traiterously assemble and join himself against this Commonwealth' and did 'give and send Intelligence.'¹⁸

"The trial began on October 30, 1780, in the large courthouse on Easton's Centre Square, which had so recently been the starting point for General Sullivan's expedition, and, before that, the scene of several Indian treaties. There were seven

witnesses for the prosecution, including two colonels; Nicholas Depue was the only witness for the defense.¹⁹ Depue, a Patriot, had been a member of the county committee which in 1776 had journeyed to Carpenters' Hall in Philadelphia to answer the call of the Continental Congress for the formation of a state militia.²⁰ One Joseph Hodge was held on bail for \$4,000, in inflated paper money, 'on condition that he appears from day to day to testify against Ralph Morden'; he seems to have been the prosecution's star witness. Robert Land was 'three times solemnly called'; as he did not appear, bond was forfeited by two citizens. Besides Land and Morden, three others were named in the indictment, two of them not present.²¹ The third man got off with a warning, having been placed on bond for good behavior.²² Only Morden, the Quaker, received the death sentence.

"The judges were Thomas McKean of Delaware, a signer of the Declaration of Independence,²³ George Bryan of Philadelphia,²⁴ and William Augustus Atlee of Lancaster,²⁵ truly a distinguished panel of jurists. They were tough, but they were not 'hanging judges.' It is an interesting point that of the four men who were hanged for treason in Pennsylvania during the Revolution, three, including Morden, were Quakers. Ordinarily, judges and juries were more lenient with fighters than with people who claimed to be pacifists. Perhaps that generalization applies in this case.

"Morden was unlucky to have as prosecuting attorney Edward Burd, war hero and former prisoner of the British. Burd's presence in this case was particularly disastrous for Morden because Burd was the young man who had married the beautiful and socially prominent Betsy Shippen of Philadelphia, older sister of Mrs. Benedict Arnold.

"The Shippens and the Burds had thrown all their influence into the balance to save this girl whom they believed to be innocent of Benedict Arnold's schemes, and lost. And now, a few days later, the young prosecutor was trying a case of treason, with everyone in the courtroom aware of his own situation. Burd could not have taken this case lightly. He may even have striven for a conviction to prove what he thought of British agents. His performance as prosecuting attorney was carefully watched, no doubt, by Chief Justice McKean, who on September 27, had been the first to inform the Supreme Executive Council of Arnold's treachery.

"Ralph Morden was condemned to death for treason. On November 9, the Supreme Executive Council in Philadelphia confirmed the sentence and set the date of execution as November 25, 1780.²⁶ Morden protested his innocence to the end, until they led him out to Gallows Hill. But if he had ever expected to be acquitted, he certainly misunderstood the men who tried him, and the temper of the times!"²⁷

Bond of New Jersey haveing Recev^d Intelegence that a Party of Torries on the 12th of this Instant had appointed to meet near the Water Gap of Delaware in this Township, and from thence make off to the Indians Headed by a Certain Robert Land late of Coshecting an old offender whom I had made Return of about 2 years ago to Council and was Confined sometime in Easton Goal but at the last Supreme Court of this County has been admitted to Bail as the Judge did not find his name in the Proclamation) Col Bond having found out the very time of their march Placed a few Volunteers in Ambush who fired upon them and wounded two of the enemy upon which two of them were made Prisoners viz. Ralph Morden and a British Prisoner who it seems had leave to run at large they had each of them near 30^{lb} of Flour on their Backs. Land tis said was seen to fall when fired upon and dropt his knapsack Beaver hat & Cane tis supposed he was mortally wounded as there was plenty of blood discovered next morning--diligent search has been made but to no purpose tis thought that he was either Killed or Convey^d away Privily by the Torries as a number of them reside near this Place where the action hapend. Morden it seems made some Confession but as the partioulars have not come to hand cannot form you there with...¹

EARLY SCENES IN CANADIAN LIFE *

"Mr. Ralph Morden, whose numerous and respectable descendants are now residing in various portions of Ontario, was born in England in 1742. His parents belonged to the Society of Friends, and members of their community were from time to time receiving glowing accounts of prosperity which had attended the settlements made in the American wildernesses, by their co-religionists, under the guidance of the intrepid William Penn. In these pictures of forest life, figured no blood-thirsty savage, with tomahawk and firebrand, putting the settlers in terror for their lives. All was peace, plenty and happiness. The wisdom and justice manifested toward the Indians, by William Penn, in his dealings with them, had early proved their friendship for the peace-loving settlers.

"Young Morden, having his thoughts thus early turned to the advantages and enjoyments of life in the Western Wilds, as he advanced toward manhood, had his mind filled with visions of wealth, honor and happiness to be enjoyed when he should have become a great landed proprietor in the far off world of scarcely credible wonders. He resolved that his home should be beyond the great sea, and as soon as he was in a position to act for himself he bent all his energies to the accomplishment of that object.

"Having learned that a ship was to sail at a given time from a certain port for the American continent (an event in those days), he made immediate preparations for his departure from his home and friends of his youth, to try his fortune in that new and strange land of promise, which had so excited the enthusiasm of his boyhood.

"His leave-taking over, and the necessary arrangements made for his voyage, buoyant with expectation, he stepped on board the ship. Nothing more remained to be done, and as he leaned listlessly against the side of the vessel, gazing upon the swiftly receding shores of his native country, the thought of all he was leaving brought a pang to his heart, that a moment before he would not have thought possible. Then he realized that he was separating himself, probably for ever, from all his loved ones at home, and tears, not unworthy of manhood, moistened his eyes. All the bright anticipation of a prosperous and happy future were insufficient to prevent a sinking of the heart, as in that moment he whispered to kindred and country 'for ever fare ye well.'

"The passage was rough and lasted three months. Shortly after becoming established upon his ESTATE he began to think that his little log cabin was not nearly so comfortable an abode as he had fancied it in the first days of his occupancy. In fact, he made the discovery that it lacked one grand essential of a happy home. During this period he had been reflecting much upon, and had given the full assent of his judgement to, the scriptural assertion--'It is not good for man to be alone'--incited to such reflections, it is to be feared, by the bright eyes and sunny smile of a fair daughter of the Emerald Isle, with whom he had become acquainted. He succeeded in recommending himself to the affections of the damsel, and ere long obtained the hand he sought. When he saw his cheerful young wife moving about his forest home, he in his heart pronounced it complete in all its appointments. Nor did the experience of the years falsify his fond anticipations. 'She did him good, and not evil all the days of his life.' They were both young, vigorous and industrious; and the virgin soil yielded them abundant returns for their toil, while sons and daughters grew up among them. Thus the happy years sped along until our young emigrant found himself at middle life, the prosperous man of his youthful visions.

"Clouds dark and portentous had long been gathering in the political horizon, but all unheeded by the happy farmer, who could not entertain so monstrous an idea, as the discontents of the colonies would culminate in war. John, their eldest son, was now quite an active lad, but still too young to bear arms, and the principles in which he had been reared did not dispose him to volunteer for services. Morden, being a Quaker, and, therefore, not considered dangerous, was allowed to pursue his usual avocations with but little interference. Thus, enjoying some of the dearest blessings of peace, in the midst of war, they rejoiced in an unbroken family circle; and thinking they had less at stake in the conflict than others, they could contemplate with comparative equanimity the fearful struggle going on in the land.

"The sympathy to the royal cause led them to afford shelter on several occasions to persons whose more active loyalty had rendered them obnoxious to the Continentals. This having been made known, by the parties thus succored, to the British Officers, secured for the Mordens their favor and protection, whenever the British were in the ascendant. This, however, proved rather a doubtful advantage, as it caused them to be regarded with suspicion by those of their neighbors who adhered to the Revolutionary cause.

"Morden had become a great woodsman, and was familiar with a large extent of the forest contiguous to his home. Like the members of his Society, generally, he had always maintained the most friendly relations with the Indians, and he possessed not a little influence over them. Some of his loyalist friends,

who had made themselves more conspicuous in the contest than was consistent with their safety where they wore, in effecting their escape to Canada, were much assisted by his knowledge of the wilderness.

"Among these was an active and daring loyalist, whose name was Land. He, with two brothers, named Faulkner, had been out on an expedition, obtaining horses without the permission of their owners, for the use of the British forces. The Americans had been made aware of the connection of these parties with the abstraction of the horses, and had for some time been seeking them; but, as yet, had been unable to arrest them. Land, finding that it had become unsafe for him to remain any longer in the country, resolved to make an attempt to reach Canada with all possible speed. To this end he solicited from Morden such aid as he had previously afforded to others in like difficulty. Well knowing the imminence of his friend's danger, Morden approved his determination to fly the country, and promised his assistance. He also advised that the Faulknors accompany him.

"The passes of the mountains were all guarded; but he agreed to pilot them through the woods, by such a route as would avoid all the American guards, to a place of which he had knowledge, at the foot of the Blue Mountain, where what is called an Indian ladder had been constructed....The mountain at this point was supposed to be impossible of ascent, and being remote from every ordinary course of travel--far away in the unfrequented depths of the forest--it had escaped observation, only a few being aware of its existence. All this--the route to be taken--and all necessary particulars, Morden communicated to Land.

"A messenger was despatched in all confidence to the Faulknors, informing them of Land's intended flight, suggesting that they should accompany him, telling them that Morden had promised to pilot them to a place of safety, and mentioning a certain time and place at which they should meet the others, if they wished to be of the party; but fortunately for Land entering into no further particulars.

"At the appointed time the two friends set out on their perilous journey and without entertaining any unexpected difficulty, reached the vicinity of the rendezvous. There, instead of the Faulknors they found a guard in readiness for their reception. There was not a moment for consultation. Morden thought only of the danger of his friend, and bidding him to fly for his life, he went forward himself, still unsuspecting of treachery,--though wondering at the presence of the guard in that unfrequented place. He was, however, apprehensive of no great danger to himself; being confident that nothing more serious than having been found there, in Land's company, could be brought against him."

Land escaped into the woods. As soon as he felt that pursuit had been abandoned he followed the instructions which Morden had given him and found the Indian ladder. He ascended it and crossed over the Blue Mountains and made his way to Canada.

Though the Faulkner Brothers failed to appear Morden was unsuspecting of them, wondering of the guards' appearance at the rendezvous. "The fact was, that when the Faulknors received Land's message, they thought the scheme of escape a very doubtful chance. But it suggested to their treacherous minds the idea of securing their own safety, by sacrificing their friends. Accordingly, they entered into negotiations with the officer commanding the Continental forces in that neighborhood, which resulted in the events above detailed. Thus Morden was taken in a trap by the very men whose lives he was endeavoring to save.

"Morden having visited the British camp some short time previous to his capture, and the region in which he lived being frequently overrun by bands--sometimes of the one party, sometimes the other--by whom the residents were often roughly handled, the commanding officer had given Morden on the occasion of his visit to the camp a letter of protection or pass. This paper he always kept on his person," and it was found when he was arrested. He was charged with being a British spy.

Morden was detained in jail some time before his trial. He had two or three occasions when he might have escaped, but he felt that in so doing he would have been regarded as guilty of the things charged against him.

The pass was produced at the trial and considered decisive proof of his being a spy. The Faulknors also appeared and swore hard against him. He was found guilty and sentenced to die the death of a spy.

"But what of the miscreants whose black ingratitude had thus revealed the kind friend who sought to serve them when in extremity? They lived much as before, but nothing seemed to prosper with them and they were not trusted by either party.

"After the termination of the war, one of them attempted to attach himself to a band of U. E. Loyalists, designing to come to Canada in that character. But one who was acquainted with his treachery caused him to be informed, that if he was ever found on British soil he would be made to expiate the blood of Morden. Discretion, therefore determined him to keep South of the lakes. Ultimately, one of them was drowned, and the other, in a fit of remorse, by his own act, terminated his miserable existence."

Ann Morden's eight children looked to her for comfort and support, and she was obliged to rouse herself from the stupor

of despair to care for the wants of the living. The prospect was dark, but aided by her son John, she succeeded in supporting her family, but they endured many hardships.

The war was still raging and many previous friends became bitter enemies. Ann decided that at the close of the war, she and her children would go to Canada. She communicated with Mr. Land in Canada who advised her about the treacherous travel with her children.

Four hundred United Empire Loyalists, including men, women and children, assembled together, and took their departure in a body for "the King's Dominions." (A lengthy account follows about the "trek" to Canada, the hardships endured, and the general feeling of the travellers about the past as well as the future. The management of the 400, as well as that of cattle, horses and some household goods was taken care of by the men and older boys, while the women and older girls prepared the meals along the way.) All except little children, delicate women, invalids and very aged persons walked.

Ann Morden found the journey an arduous task. "But her eldest son, John, now almost eighteen years of age, proved a valuable auxilliary, taking charge of the family effects, and lightening her burdens. His filial affection was the solace and joy of her widowed heart. He thenceforth stood manfully by his mother through all the trials and privations of her particularly painful lot, to the termination of her useful and eventful life.

"The Mordens settled in Flanders, not far from the place where Dundas has since grown up; here they were soon after visited by Governor Simcoe, who, having become acquainted with their painful antecedents, took this early opportunity of expressing his sympathy and good will to the widow and her family.

"As an acknowledgement of what they had suffered during the revolution, and as an indication of respect for the family, and the part John Morden had acted throughout, he gave him two hundred acres of land, where he had located himself, and an order for nine hundred more."

Another lengthy article of the hardships met in settling in a new land is recorded. Burlington Bay served as a highway for dwellers upon the shores. In summer grain and other commodities were transported thereon, and in the winter on the ice. There were numerous air-holes which made ice-travel dangerous.

In one of these air holes Mrs. Morden had well-nigh lost her life, while crossing the Bay to visit her old friends, the Lands. Mrs. Morden was seated with a little boy in a small sleigh, which was being pushed over the ice by a young man. When near the middle of the "Little Lake" as the Bay was called, he not having observed where he was going, pushed the

sleigh onto the brittle ice surrounding an air-hole. The ice giving way, the whole party was precipitated into the water. Fortunately a portion was covered with an under layer of ice upon which the sleigh caught fast. "The ice would not bear the weight of the young man, so he could not assist the two occupants. Leaving them alone there and going for help seemed to be the only thing to do. Mrs. Morden and her grandson, as is believed by the writer, sat in the sleigh filled with ice-cold water. (Before help came she reviewed her whole life.) Friends arrived bringing rails and other necessary things to bear their weight to enable them to reach the sleigh and remove Mrs. Morden and the child.

"This was but one of the many dangerous adventures through which Mrs. Morden passed during the life of hardships in the Canadian wilds.

"In later years she removed with her son to Westminster, and died in the township of London at the advanced age of eighty-nine years."

* This prose poem was written by George A. Kingston, born 1870, died 1943. He was a lawyer and from 1914-1935 he was a commissioner with the Workmen's Compensation Board of Ontario. This prose poem was contributed by Ralph Morden of Niagara Falls, Ontario. (We feel that a much more authentic account of Robert Land and Ralph Morden is given by Professor Coleman, but we are using this prose poem for the story value interest. A. P. A. and A. P. T.)

Ralph soon found his destination
 Met the friends who urged his coming
 Looked the land and country over,
 Every prospect seemed to please him,
 So he made his plans to settle
 On a large and fertile acreage
 'Cross the Delaware from Cocheton
 In the state of Pennsylvania.

With the aid of friendly neighbours
 Builds he soon a good log cabin,
 And proceeds then, single handed
 To develop his broad acres,
 But forsooth there's something lacking;
 What is home without a woman?
 What is man without a helpmate?
 There Ralph meets another problem.

Shortly after coming thither
 Meets a sweet-faced Irish Maiden,
 With the simple name, Ann Durham,
 From a titled Irish family
 'Twined himself in her affections;
 Love soon found a chord responsive
 In the heart of each to other,
 And in due time Ralph's log cabin
 Sees a happy married couple
 Settle down to life's beginnings.
 Here they dwelt in love abounding,
 Here the family grew and prospered;
 Three fine boys and two young maidens
 Blessed the home so simple started.
 But what tragedy awaits them!

War clouds hover o'er the country,
 Ominous news disturbs the people,
 Days of war are barking fiercely,
 Now they break the leash that held them
 And grim terror grips the settlers.
 Morden an unyielding Quaker,
 Known as such amongst his neighbours -
 (Ever against war, their motto) -
 Claims his right as non-combatant;
 Full four years the strife continued
 With him simply an observer.
 With this bitter struggle round him,
 Ralph pursues his daily labours,
 Meeting oft small soldier parties
 Sometimes one side, then the other -
 Doing little acts of kindness
 Where the chance occasion offered
 Thus by both sides unmolested
 Lived this peaceful Quaker farmer.

But on one such chance occasion
 Having done some act of kindness
 To a British soldier column
 He was given a friendly letter
 By the officer commanding,
 To be used by way of passport
 Should he later be molested
 By another British party
 This he carried on his person.

Ralph's friends were not all so peaceful
 Robert Land the name of one was
 Other two the Faulkner brothers,
 These three men were strongly British
 Land had been in active service
 Since the outbreak of the struggle.
 John his eldest son was interned
 To make sure 'gainst his enlisting
 There are only on the homestead
 Mrs. Land and her young children,
 Eking out a bare existence.

As the struggle fierce developed
 So increased the bitter feeling
 'Gainst all British sympathizers.
 Soon came days of harsh reprisals;
 Mrs. Land and her five children -
 Were one night all marked for slaughter;
 But a friendly Indian warning
 Gave them chance to flee for safety -
 Scarce with clothes enough to cover.

Safe concealed within the forest,
 Saw their home destroyed by fire
 In the glare thus thrown around it
 Recognized in the marauders
 Neighbour men disguised as Indians.
 "War is hell" said Gen. Sherman;
 On such scenes as these he pondered.

After suffering untold hardships
 Mrs. Land and all the family
 Reached N.Y. without detection -
 It still held by British forces -
 Where, of course, they found assistance.
 Here she heard not long thereafter
 That her husband had been fired on
 As he fled from his pursuers,
 And was killed - such were the tidings.
 In due time they reached a party
 Of U.E. Loyalists
 Who were going to New Brunswick
 Here they spent some years of struggle.

Come we back to Land and Faulkners,
 Land we said, had been for three years
 Serving with the British forces.
 Due to knowledge of the country
 Had been given special duty
 But his zeal in this performing
 Marked him out for special vengeance
 By the embittered Continentals.
 Faulkner's exploits also served to
 Put a premium on their capture.

Shortly after the destruction
 Of his home, some special duty
 Brought Land back near Cocheton village.
 So, he thought he'd risk a visit
 To his loved ones he had left there.
 Shocked he finds the farm deserted,
 All the buildings and the crops burned.
 Fearing to disclose his presence
 To the people of the district,
 Makes his way to his friend Morden,
 Still residing on his homestead,
 Feeling sure of his protection.

Here he learns with deep emotion
 Of what fate befell his loved ones
 Though indeed there was but little
 Known of what had them befallen -
 Either they had all been murdered
 Or had perished in the forest.
 All he learned was they had vanished
 And the forest held the secret.

Ralph, as friend, advises Robert
 Of the vengeance sworn against him;
 Tells him he must flee the country.
 Well they knew that all the passes
 Would now be securely guarded
 But to help his friend in trouble
 Ralph here offers his assistance.

Morden hunting with the Indians
 Had learned well the mountain by-ways
 Learned to scale the forest hill-sides
 By a clever Indian tree-way -
 Stopped up somewhat like a ladder;
 Thus he planned to guide Land over,
 Past the guards who held the passes.

'Twas agreed 'Twixt Land and Morden
 To invite the Faulkner brothers
 To join with them in their purpose
 Of escaping o'er the mountains;
 So the word was sent unto them,
 Giving hour and place of meeting

As they wished to take advantage
Of this chance to flee for safety,
But Alas - another Jude.

When they got this word, the Faulknor's
Saw at once what they considered
Might ensure for them safe pardon -
Simply play the part of traitors.
Why not sell this information
As the price of their own safety,
And betray both Land and Morden
To the Continental soldiers?

So it comes when these two neighbours
On the day and hour of meeting,
Reached the spot to which they journeyed
Near the foot of Ralph's tree ladder,
'Stead of finding there, the Faulknors
Found a waiting band of guardsmen.
See they now their base betrayal.

Land advised to flee for safety
Soon outfoots his keen pursuers
Though he does receive a bullet,
From the musket of a guardsman.
Ralph unconscious of wrong-doing
Gives himself up to them freely
Feeling there is nought against him
Save this aid to friend in danger.

But as soon as he's arrested
Search is made of his belongings,
There is found upon his person
That inculminating letter
So he's charged at once with treason.
Strongly he protests against this
Yet in spite of explanations
He is kept in close confinement
'Gainst - his coming day of trial,
When at last he comes on trial
Stand against him take the Faulknors
This to save their necks from halter
Price they pay for ill-bought freedom;
But on top of this the letter
Given him for an act of kindness
To these men so bent to "get him"
For his part in helping Land out
Deemed enough to hang his guilt on.

Guilty, Death, O Go Forgive them.
 But with this we'll draw a curtain
 O'er the tragedy which follows
 Save this note to place on record
 Of the date and place of trial:
 'Twas the 13th of October
 In the year of 1780
 In the little town of Easton in the state of Penn.,
 Trial Judge, McKean, Chief Justice
 And the date of execution
 25th November following.

Mrs. Morden noble woman
 Sore at heart and crushed in spirit
 Bore it like a Spartan mother;
 Bravely she must face the future
 For the sake of her young children.

Come we back again to Land's part
 In this story so romantic
 Of eluding his pursuers,
 When Ralph Morden was arrested,
 He found refuge in the forest
 Where with herbs he dressed his flesh wound,
 When he felt all danger over
 Ventured out into the clearing
 Seeking there to get his bearings.
 Morden had well outlined to him
 Where to reach the Indian's "ladder",
 This he found and scaled the mountain.
 After weeks of untold hardships
 He in safety reached the border
 And crossed over at Niagara
 Where the Loyalists gave him welcome.
 He was granted a location
 For an area near the Great falls,
 But the roaring of the waters
 On a mind distraught with anguish
 Drove him nigh into distraction.
 So he traded his location
 For a section farther westward.

Thus it comes that at the Lake-head
 Where now stands a noble city,
 Robert Land received his Crown grant;
 Built his cabin in the clearing;
 Lived alone there nigh a decade,
 Tilled his land but mourned in secret
 The hard fate that had pursued him;
 For he quite believed the story
 That his family had been murdered
 Or had perished in the forest,
 But a happier day awaits him.

After few years in New Brunswick
 Mrs. Land with her four children
 Plans to migrate farther westward
 Hearing tales of brightest promise
 For the settlers at Niagara.
 This then is their destination.

Trekking west proved long and tedious -
 Travel all on foot or horseback -
 Made their living on the journey;
 Called and stayed a while at Cocheton
 Where her eldest son had settled
 And rebuilt the family homestead;
 Here he'd been since war was ended
 And decides to there continue.

When the others reached Niagara
 They secured a frontier cabin;
 Here the boys maintained the family
 Fishing, hunting and such farm work
 As they got from other settlers.

Full two years they had resided
 In that place, when comes a peddler
 Who by chance said he had met with
 One by same name at the Lake-head,
 Only 40 miles to westward.

Then they all began to wonder
 Father killed? Was he for certain?
 After all, 'twas only rumour;
 Possibly he had succeeded
 In escaping thro' the forest.
 With such thoughts their hopes they strengthen
 As they plan a trip to Lake-head.

So it comes that some days later,
 Robert Land, his days work ended,
 Sitting outside his small cabin,
 Resting from his toilsome labour,
 Thinking of his lone existence
 Sees some stirring in the bushes.
 Lined on either side the pathway
 Leading to his simple cottage.
 When emerging from the forest
 Sees a party coming towards him,
 Woman, daughter, with three young men -
 What can such a party want here?
 Then a look of recognition -
 "God in heaven, do eyes deceive me?
 Lord be praised it's true, it is true".
 Oh the joy of Resurrection.

To commemorate this reunion
 Robert plants a weeping willow
 In the yard in front his cabin
 Memory's shrine for tears of gladness
 Shed by all upon the meeting.

Grants of land the boys are given
 In the block beside the Father's
 And ere long a prosperous family
 Sees dame Fortune on them smiling
 As a city sub-division
 Takes in all their great broad acres.

Cabin soon gives place to mansion
 Which was known to all as "Landholm"
 Stately city home it then was.
 Here the Lands and their descendants
 Made their home for years hereafter.
 Now it's "Home" for friendless children
 In a great and growing city -
 Verily a city landmark -
 But still stands the weeping willow.

Shortly after this re-union
 Robert thinks of Mrs. Morden
 Struggling with her growing family
 In their home in Pennsylvania
 Quite unhappy in surroundings
 Which were none too sympathetic.
 So he writes to her, suggesting
 That she join a Loyalist party
 Soon to make a trek to northward.

So it comes that in the next year
 She arrives with all her household
 And is given a warm reception
 By her former war-time neighbours.
 In due time the family settled
 On a Loyalist location
 Where is now the town of Dundas.
 Here a year or two thereafter
 They were visited by Simcoe
 Who gave large increase of land grant
 Compensation for their suffering.

John lived on in his location
 Where his home was always Mother's,
 Until sometime in his twenties
 He moved west to London Township.
 Where at age of 89 years
 This heroic noble woman,
 Honoured high by all the country,
 Paid the last great debt of Nature
 And was gathered to her fathers.

All the sons and daughters married
 And so families now were started,
 Generations since succeeding
 Spread abroad throughout the country
 Till these days, seven, score years later
 Numberless far-flung descendents
 Of the martyr'd Quaker farmer
 Rise up all to call him blessed.

On the Land side of the story
 Ephriam second son of Robert
 Had a son they christened John Scott.
 He in turn had son named Charlie;
 Trained he was to be a Doctor.
 As a young man he decided
 He might venture on returning
 To that country o'er the river
 Whence this grandpere had been exiled.
 In Detroit he chose to settle.

Dr. Charlie had a daughter
 Evangeline who married Lindbergh,
 Their one son is Charles Augustus
 Known so well the wide world over
 Flier daring and intrepid,
 For whose flight across the ocean
 He is known as the "Lone Eagle".
 Next is Charles Augustus Jr.,
 Kidnapped babe of Hopewell Villa.
 At the moment of the writing
 Of the last lines of this story,
 All the world agast and helpless
 Stands by waiting each new broadcast,
 Hoping that the glad announcement
 Will be made "The Child's Recovered".
 Peace time, sure doth have its horrors
 No less dread than those of war time.
 "Found but dead and foully murdered".
 Round the world these tragic tidings
 Flash - Mankind is dumb with horror!
 Language fails to give expression
 To these sympathetic feelings
 Stirred in every human bosom
 At the thought of crime so ruthless.

Out of this great tribulation
 Lindbergh like your great ancestor,
 You'll emerge into the open!
 As you bridged the perilous waters,
 With a courage so undaunted,
 So across this vale of shadow;
 Your brave wife with you as pilot
 You'll achieve still greater triumph.

"The Loyalists were those people who remained loyal to Britain during the American Revolution, and found it necessary or desirable to leave the United States, either before or soon after the Treaty of Separation in the year, 1783. A great many came to Canada. The removal of the Loyalists started in March, 1776, from Boston and New York to Nova Scotia. Those Loyalists from the northern and western portions of the Province of New York migrated by overland routes to the (now) Provinces of Ontario and Quebec. Loyalists from Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Massachusetts and Vermont joined them, many following two military highways that led to Ogdensburg or Oswego, and the others taking the water route either by way of Lake Champlain and the Richelieu River to Sorel (Quebec) and then going up the St. Lawrence, or coming overland to Ogdensburg. Many of them came to Kingston and the townships about the Bay of Quinte.

"And the Loyalists were by no means all of English or British descent. They contained large numbers of New York Dutch, the descendants of the founders of New Amsterdam and Albany; German Palatines whose ancestors settled Pennsylvania. There were descendants of the original Swedish settlers of Rhode Island and of the French Huguenots of New Rochelle. There were large numbers of Quakers, the Highland Scotch settlers of Sir William Johnson, and the Mohawk Branch of the Six Nations. They were of all classes, all occupations, all denominations and all nationalities represented in the Colonies."

HISTORY OF THE U. E. L. ASSOCIATION OF CANADA

With the object of organizing the means of reserving and gathering in one place the historic records of the first U. E. Loyalists, and to perpetuate the spirit of loyalty in the inheritors of so noble a tradition, the formation of a Loyalist Association was resolved upon on February 28th, 1896. In 1913 a Dominion Association was formed, to unite the various local and provincial associations. In May 1914 the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada passed an Act creating the United Empire Loyalists' Association of Canada, the purposes being set out as follows:

- (1) To unite together, irrespective of creed or political party, the descendants of those families who, during the American War of 1775 to 1783, sacrificed their homes in retaining their loyalty to the British Crown; and to perpetuate this spirit of loyalty to the Empire.

- (2) To preserve the history and traditions of that important epoch in Canadian history, by rescuing from oblivion the history and traditions of the Loyalist families before it is too late.
- (3) To collect together in a suitable place the portraits, relics and documents relating to the United Empire Loyalists, which are now scattered throughout the Dominion.
- (4) To publish a historical and genealogical journal, or annual transactions.

There is a decoration, or badge, which a member has the right to wear. There are also two crests.

To become a member, a person should be able to trace descent from one of the Loyalist families who came to Canada in the period mentioned, and whose names are listed as having received grants of land. For an application form write to Mrs. L. N. McLean, 833-A Bathurst Street, Toronto 4, Ontario.

A brief description of the letters "U. E.": Those loyalists who have adhered to the Unity of the Empire and joined the Royal Standard before the Treaty of Separation in the year 1783, and all their Children, and their Descendants, by either sex, are to be distinguished by the following Capitals affixed to their names: U. E., alluding to their great principle The Unity of the Empire.

Mrs. Ross Glassford (genealogist of the Dominion Council and Toronto Branch, U. E. L.) gave permission to use any information of the U. E. L. sent by herself, Mrs. W. K. Nobbs (Rec. Sec. of the U. E. L., Gov. Simcoe Branch, Toronto) or Mrs. Norman M. Spack (Sec. of the Hamilton Branch of the U. E. L., Hamilton, Ontario). These three women are responsible for all the U. E. L. information we have used, including the excerpt from the Horace Hume Van Wart booklet, and the following information on the U. E. L. Monument.

The United Empire Loyalist Monument is intended to perpetuate the memory of those colonists of New England who remained loyal to the British Government during the period of the American Revolutionary War, afterwards removing to what is now the Dominion of Canada, where they were given land on which to begin afresh.

The United Empire Loyalist Monument erected in Prince's Square in front of the Wentworth County Court House at Hamilton, Ontario, Canada, and unveiled May 23rd, 1929, Empire Day, was designed and executed by Mr. Sydney March, of Farnborough, Kent County, England.

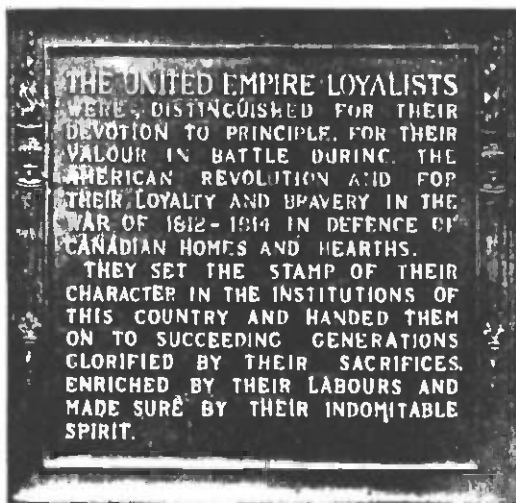
The bronze plinth depicts the moment in the life of the Loyalist and his faithful partner when having drawn his lot number from the Government surveyor he and his wife are looking forward with satisfaction and keenness, not unmixed with curiosity, to the location of their new home in Canada after the turmoil of many years of warfare and after having lost all of their worldly possessions.

The pedestal of the monument, erected on a solid foundation of concrete, is constructed entirely and fittingly of Queenston dolomite stone from the quarries situated almost on the battlefield of Queenston Heights on the Canadian side of the Niagara River. The height of the stone pedestal is $7\frac{1}{2}$ feet. The base measures $10\frac{1}{2}$ feet by $18\frac{1}{2}$ feet. The height of the loyalist is eight feet and the other figures are in proportion. The weight of the bronze group of four persons and the bronze base on which it stands is approximately three and a half tons. Two of the bronze panels attached to the sides of the pedestal and which tell the story of the loyalists, are three by six feet, while the remaining two are three by three feet.

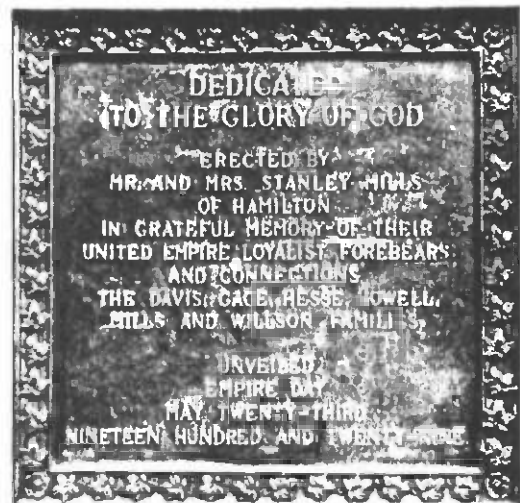




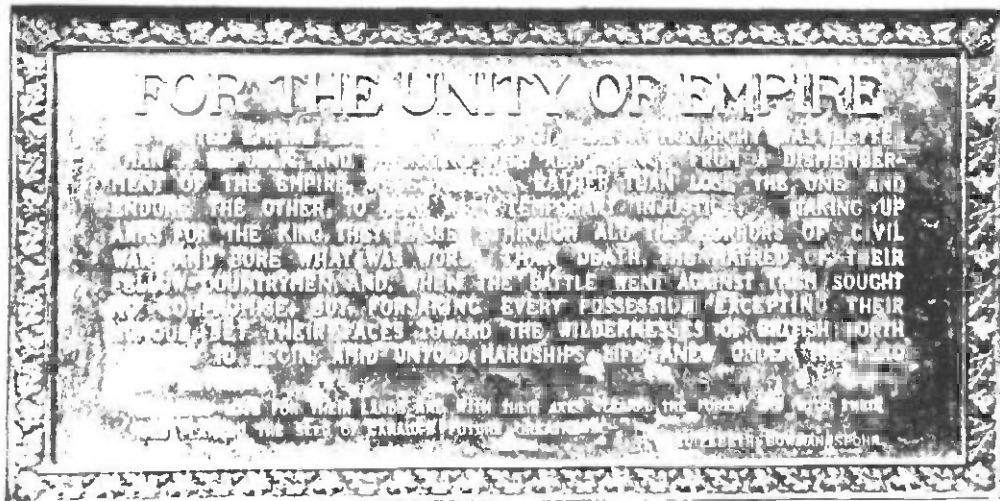
The Front Panel Inscription (North), size 3 x 6 feet, facing Main Street

from Here and There

(Page numbers refer to page in the genealogy section where the listing for the person, or family, occurs. Some of these stories are actual occurrences, and some have come down merely as "legends" in the various branches of the family. In some instances, from various lines have come the same story with only minor variations. These variations are also included.)

Page 2. Was a publication in London, England, with the following heading on the note paper: "News of the World," Ltd., was a typewritten note from the editor evidently in answer to a query about early Mordens in London. Quoting from the printed notation at the bottom of the small page: 'The Editor presents his Compliments and begs to state that, while every care is taken to ensure accuracy, this information is given on the strict understanding that no legal or other liability is thereby incurred, and can only be used on that understanding.' Above this printed caution, was typed the following:

'The Lord Mayor of London was Simon Morden or Mordon according to different authorities. His year of office was 1868.

'There was a Mr. Robert Morden who was a publisher of maps in London who died in 1703.

'The most famous of the name was Sir John Morden who founded Morden College, Blackheath, London, SE where a number of decayed City merchants end their old age in comfort.

'Sir John had a romantic career. His ships were captured by Barbary pirates and he was brought to penury.

'The ships were set free and returned laden with treasure. He invested his wealth in the East India Company of which he became a director and founded the college as a thank offering. It is now one of London's wealthiest charities.'

(The above was loaned to us by Mrs. Althea Bell⁹, page J97, who loaned us many papers which her father and her grandfather had assembled in compiling information about the Morden family.)

Page 2. "According to my father, John Alfred Morden, the very early Mordens were named 'Mordendy' or 'Mordandy'. They were English ship builders; their physical appearance, height, build, etc. indicating descent from the Vikings."

--Kenneth C. Morden⁹, page R51

Page 2. "A few years ago I wrote to someone in Morden, England and received a reply. This place is about 12 miles from London, is noted for a cathedral over 600 years old, and for being a famous burial ground. It received some publicity long ago as the trysting place of Lord Nelson and his amours. The writer did not mention any Mordens involved in this scandal, although there must have been a reason for leaving England. No Mordens reside there at the present time."--Kenneth C. Morden⁹, p. R51.

"If you wish to go back into antiquity tracing the genealogy I understand there is a book somewhere in Toronto, Ontario that gives the entire early history. It is probably in the Provincial Library. It mentions Mordens as members of Parliament, and also a Sir John Morden."--Kenneth C. Morden⁹, p. R51.

R 18. "When Ralph Morden first came to America on his pleasure trip he met Ann Durham quite by accident. He went hunting on a warm day and became thirsty, so he wanted some water to drink. He stopped at her house. Instead of water she gave him a glass of buttermilk and they visited while he drank it. That was the beginning of their romance."--Edna E. Davis⁹, p. R46.

"The early Morden who came to America (possibly it was Ralph Morden, b. 1742) was riding horseback across the countryside and as he approached a farm, the daughter of the farm saw him silhouetted against the sky, and before she even met him or before he reached the farm, she said, "That is the man I am going to marry."

--Kenneth C. Morden⁹, p. R51

One day while working in the kitchen Ann Durham saw a horseback rider approaching her father's farm. Her father talked with him, offered him a drink from the well and drew water for his horse. The rider then rode on. Ann stopped her father on his way to his interrupted task, and asked why he had not invited the stranger to stop. Ann sent her father to overtake him and to invite him to return and share their next meal with them. Thus began their courtship.

R 18. Ralph Morden⁴. An article appeared in The Canadian Magazine, August 1928, Vol. 70, No. 2, telling somewhat the same story of Robert Land and Ralph Morden as appears in the articles in this work. The article referred to above was written by George Pearson.

- R 18. Ann Durham Morden, widow of Ralph Morden⁴. According to some relatives, Ann Durham was related to Lord Durham who was the first Governor-General of Canada. We have been advised from several sources that such relationship has not been verified by them.
- R 18. Ann Durham Morden could speak 'Mohawk' and rode horse-back to the Indian pow-wows with Gov. Simcoe to act as interpreter. At her request Gov. Simcoe brought an ivory covered Prayer-Book for her from England. This is now in the archives in London.--from Mrs. Norman Spack

Ann Durham Morden brought a hand made cradle of Pennsylvania pine from the States. It is now in the Dundas Historical Society Museum in Dundas, 139 Park Street, West Dundas, Ontario.--sent to Mrs. N. Spack by Miss Olive Newcombe

- R 18. Catharine Morden⁵. Conflicting stories have come down about this family:
- A.: Elias Long was shot for treason (or hanged, as some stories have it).
- B.: They both died in Pennsylvania and Ann Morden brought the children to Canada.
- C.: Elias Long brought his children to Niagara and Ann Morden raised them. However, there was an Elias Long who on June 3, 1794 was granted Lot 46, Conc. 3 in Ancaster Twp. (adjacent to W. Flamboro), but the Ancaster record shows nothing else, so it is doubtful if he settled there. Then there was an Elias Long who on 28/3/1797 asked for family lands and for lands for his wife, the daughter of a Loyalist. He got 400 acres--200 for his family (that would be for four children) and 200 for his wife. It is assumed that these two Elias's were the same. If so, it is possible that Elias brought his family to Canada and Ann Morden had custody of them for a while.
- According to land grant records there have been the following:
- Jacob Long (Is he related? How?) got 200 acres, 6/6, Townsend Twp.
- Philip Long (related?) got 200 acres.
- An Elias got Crown Patent for 200 acres, 46/3 Ancaster, 6/5/1797; also 200 acres, 5/7, Townsend.
- An Elias Long bought 19/1, W. Flamboro and sold to John Beamer before 1794.
- (There has been some question as to the total number of children in this family. Can any of you readers supply any further information?)

R 18. Ann Durham Morden, widow of Ralph Morden⁴, her children and two grandchildren, Mary and Jane Long, all came to West Flamboro, Ontario. The following are the family grants there (Lot 14, Concession 1 is written 14/1. All grants are listed this way in this work.):

Ann Durham Morden, 100 acres, 16/1, 17/1
 David Morden, 200 acres, 14/1
 Ralph Morden, 200 acres, 15/1
 John Morden, 396 acres, 18/1, 26/2
 James Morden, 200 acres, 27/2, 28/2
 Moses Morden, 400 acres, 20/2, 21/2

Ann Durham Morden, 100 acres, 18/3, Barton Twp., now in City of Hamilton (in addition to above grant.)

The girls, Eleanor, Elizabeth and Ann ("Nancy"), got land (as daughters of a U.E.) when they married; so did the two Long girls, but these grants were not in West Flamboro. Catharine died before the trek to Canada and Jane stayed in the U.S. Ralph left West Flamboro and died "Abroad". Ann, or Nancy, married and lived in Nelson Twp. James and Moses stayed in West Flamboro. Today only Clifford and his two children remain in this vicinity (5th and 6th generations from Ann). Ann Morden and her relatives got nearly 1800 acres as grants from the crown, all in West Flamboro Twp. Other relatives bought 700 acres more very early.

George Morden⁴, s. of George³, bought 200 acres, 10/2 in West Flamboro, 1800

Jonathan Morden⁵, s. of George⁴, bought 200 acres, 7/2 in West Flamboro, 1801

James Morden⁶, s. of Jonathan⁵, bought about 300 acres, 8/2, 7/3 in West Flamboro, ca. 1810.

R 21. Moses Morden⁵. Born in Pennsylvania 1769; d. ca. 1837. Served with New Jersey Volunteers until 1784. Joined his mother at Fort Niagara and chose land in West Flamboro. Got Crown Patent for 20/2 and 21/2 there and registered them November 27, 1798. On the 1816 Assessment Roll he had 125 uncultivated and 35 cultivated acres, a framed one-story house and 3 horses. He was probably buried on his own farm. John L. Morden⁶ and Ralph Morden⁶ were legatees of Moses, 8/9/1837. They sold part of 20/2 on 8/9/1837 for £720.

- R 40. James Morden⁵, s. of Ralph⁴; b. 1775. He served in His Majesty's Provincial Regt. called the King's Royal Regiment of New York and got his discharge in Montreal in 1785. He joined his mother at Fort Niagara and with her chose land in West Flamboro, settling there in 1787. He got the Crown Patent for 27¹/₂ and 28¹/₂, and registered it 1/12/1798.
- R 41. V. John Morden⁵, b. 21/1/1768; d. 24/1/1832. He joined the King's Royal Regiment after his father's death and served until February 1784, when he returned home. Moved to West Flamboro with his mother in 1787. Got 400 acres, 18/1, 26/2. In 1816 he owned 360 acres uncultivated and 40 acres cultivated in West Flamboro, plus 200 acres in London district. In 1822 moved to Westminster Twp., Middlesex Co., near London, Ontario. He is buried in the Old North Street Methodist Cemetery on the Talbot Road about halfway between St. Thomas and London. (Mr. T. R. Woodhouse of Hamilton, Ontario has a photo of his tombstone which he has permitted us to copy.) It is possible that his mother, Ann Durham Morden, is also buried there, but there is no stone. John Morden⁵ had eight sons who settled in the county. At one time there was a community near London, Ontario, known as 'Mordens'.
- R 42. Sarah Ann Morden⁸, b. 16/9/1850; d. 30/4/1897. Sarah was one of the two oldest of eight children in the family of John Durham Morden⁷ and Hannah Lewis Morden when they moved from near London, Ontario to Nebraska City by covered wagon in 1865. Two children had previously died in Canada. One was born in June 1866 after their arrival in Nebraska City. Sarah was 15 when her father died and she had to help her mother. She learned the millinery trade and in 1871 moved to Humboldt, Nebraska. She helped to organize the ME Church there. William N. Nims, whom she married, had come from Wisconsin with his brother and they operated the first store in Humboldt in 1867.
- R 42. Charles Augustus Morden⁸, b. 26/4/1852; d. 28/1/1933. Upon the death of his father, John Durham Morden, Charles helped the family finances by carrying a paper route. From this he became an apprentice in a printing office, later becoming a wandering printer. His travels carried him over a great portion of the United States beginning at Omaha. Then St. Joseph, St. Louis, Cincinnati (his first experience in a book store) and then to Washington where he was placed in the government printing office by Senator Hitchcock, father of the owner of the Omaha World-Herald where he remained for three years. He took to the road

again, working in Columbus, Ohio, then New Orleans, back to Boston, New York City, Galveston, Denver, Cheyenne and San Francisco. From there to Reno, Nevada, Virginia City, Eureka, Nevada, and back again to San Francisco. From there he took a steamer to Seattle, and from there to Portland, Oregon where he settled down in 1881. He went to work on The Oregonian as a sub, became foreman of the composing room, then superintendent of all departments. He became assistant manager of The Oregonian on January 1, 1907. Late in January of 1919 he was made manager of the paper, a position he held until 1927. His more than forty years' connection with The Oregonian enabled him to watch the growth of not only the paper but the city where he was an influential citizen. His wife, the former Ada Frances Northrup, was the daughter of some of the earliest pioneers to arrive in Portland.

- R 46. Margaret Ann Buttery⁸ and husband George W. H. Davis. In 1880 George and Margaret Davis and their son William moved to Chicago where they lived for four years. In 1884 they moved to North Dakota, which was then the northern part of Dakota Territory and filed on land there. As pioneers in Dakota, George and Margaret Davis took a large part in formulating the policies of their community and the new state of North Dakota. In the History of North Dakota which includes the "Biographies of the Builders of the Commonwealth" there is a full page "steel plate portrait" of George W. H. Davis and about a page and a half devoted to telling of his life work. (Book compiled by W. B. Hennessy and published by the Bismark Tribune, N. Dakota, in 1910.)

George Davis represented Ramsey County in the state legislature through three successive terms. He was active in school affairs, as well as those of the county, city, state, and church. He was instrumental in acquiring the two northern tiers of townships of Ramsey County, from Cavalier County. In his life time, he and his wife helped build six churches. Both were actively interested in the Chautauqua movement and held office in the Chautauqua Assembly Association at Devils Lake, North Dakota.

- R 47. Hazel Margueritte Davis⁹, dau. of Margaret and George Davis spent most of her life in Great Falls, Montana. She also took great interest in civic affairs. At the time of her death she was active in seventeen organizations, among them the BPW (Business and Professional Women) of which she was the first president of the Great Falls BPW, the YWCA on whose board she had served since it was first organized in Great Falls. Another organization was one for handicapped children.

- R 47. Edna Eleanor Davis⁹, dau. of Margaret and George Davis graduated from Hamline University in St. Paul, Minnesota. She taught at the state school for the deaf in Devils Lake, North Dakota. Her interest in the deaf increased and she was trained at Central Institute for the Deaf in Saint Louis, Missouri where she also taught for five years. Feeling the need for more field experience she went to Spokane in 1922 on a leave of absence. At the close of the year she felt there was too much to be done there to leave, so stayed on, and in a few years was made Head Teacher, and finally principal of the school. In February of 1954 a new \$74,000 school building was dedicated and named the Edna E. Davis School for the acoustically handicapped.

Edna Davis has been listed in Who's Who of American Women, First Edition, Volume 1, 1958-1959, published by Marquis-Who's Who Incorporated, Chicago 11, Illinois; also listed again in the Second Edition, and also the Third Edition. Also listed in Who's Who in the West, the Seventh Edition, 1960, published by the same company as above. This listing was also repeated in the 1963-64 issue. Her listing is to also appear in The Dictionary of International Biography published in London, England.

- R 51. James Morden⁷, grandfather of Clifford⁹, Kenneth⁹ and Edgar⁹, secured and planted peas from a mummy's grave. These were very productive, but he would not sell any or give them away. He stored them in his barn, hoping to sell them all to a seed company. The barn was burned and all the peas were lost. He was referred to as "Jimmy, the pea-man", much to the embarrassment of some relatives. It is said that he invented a pea-harvester which is still being manufactured by McClary's Iron Works at London, Ont.

- R 51. "My father, John Alfred Morden⁸, had some recognition as a naturalist; once was offered a teaching position at a college and was admired for his great memory. I think he knew the Bible by heart, or nearly so. He served in the first World War, and continued to study and marvel at the wonders of God's creation (nature) until he died. I know that he had a great fund of knowledge of nature. I do not exaggerate when I say he knew the names, both Latin English, of every bird of North America, and could identify each by its call. He knew every tree, plant, grass and flower and what their uses were, and many, many other secrets of nature. He was well acquainted with Indian methods of using medicinal herbs and of tanning skins. He was a taxidermist, although by the time I came along he had just about given it up. My mother encouraged me to watch him. She said, 'Go in the kitchen and watch your father. You will see that old dead owl gradually come to life.'--Kenneth C. Morden⁹, p. R51.

- R 60. Daniel Morden⁶, b. ca. 1808 at Dundas; d. 21/6/1860 at Westminster, near London. On the 1842 census he was listed as living on 48/1 Westminster Twp with 3 children.
- R 60. V. John Morden⁶, b. 25/10/1800, was killed while felling trees in his forest. In the family of John Wesley Morden⁸, his grandson, are several items which belonged to Mary Ann Parkinson Morden, wife of John⁶. Among them are several pieces of gilt-trimmed china dishes, a quilt pieced and quilted by Mary Ann Morden when she was past 80 years of age, a pancake griddle used through the years by her, and a quilt block. A rose-wood cane which has been handed down to the eldest son whose name is John is now in the keeping of John Crawford Morden¹⁰, s. of John Albert⁹ s. of John Wesley⁸, s. of John Parkinson⁷, s. of John⁶. The cane will go to John Beverley¹¹, s. of John Crawford. It is believed that Mary Ann Parkinson brought this cane with her from Ireland, as she brought a rose-wood grandfather's clock with wooden works to Canada when she came.
- R 64. From the Los Angeles Times, Los Angeles, California, on April 3, 1962: "Services for Dr. Roy R. Morden, 81, retired physician and surgeon and founder of the Poly Clinic Hospital in Des Moines, will be conducted at 2 p.m. today at the Church of the Hills in Forest Lawn Memorial-Park, Hollywood Hills, under the direction of Forest Lawn Mortuary. He came to California 16 years ago after his retirement. He was a graduate of the University of Illinois and Physicians and Surgeons College in Chicago. He leaves his widow, Ora; a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Souers, and three grandchildren."
- R 68. VII. John Parkinson Morden⁷, s. of John and Mary Ann Parkinson Morden. The mother was a sister of Major Parkinson, and was born in Seaford, County Down, Ireland. Her family, which consisted of herself and two brothers, Thomas and James, were early immigrants to Canada, and were among the early settlers of Middlesex County. John Parkinson was reared to farm life, and received his early education in the common schools, completing his studies in Cobourg College. At the age of twenty-six he began the study of theology, being ordained a minister of the Methodist Church in 1860. In 1853 he married Prudence Shotwell, daughter of Clarkson F. and Keziah Shotwell, natives of New Jersey, whose grandfather, James Shotwell, was an expressman for General George Washington during the Revolutionary War. Two of the many poems written by Prudence Morden are contained in this work and were among others which were published in the leading journals of her time. (Those in this work directly follow the U.E.L. pages.)

There is a Professor Morden H. Long, of Edmonton, Alberta who has sent the following:

"I have only one isolated reference to the name 'Morden' which I bear. It is a copy of a 'grant of land to Catherine Long of the County of Haldimand in the District of Niagara, daughter of Lawrania Morden otherwise Lawrania Forrest, her heirs and assigns forever, etc., etc.' The document is dated June 8, 1803, and bears the signature of Peter Hunter, Lt. Governor of Upper Canada and of Peter Russell, the Attorney General of the Province."

Professor Long goes on to say that he and Mrs. Long "conjecture that the Catherine Long, daughter of Lawrania Morden, here referred to, was my father's father's mother, but we are not at all sure of this as my ancestry on my grandfather Long's side disappears into the mist at this point."

(It looks to us as though Professor Long is definitely descended from Catherine Morden⁵, directly above, as her mother was Laurania Howell who married Joseph Morden⁴ and who later married a Matthew Forrest after Joseph Morden's death. See page J80. Can any one supply any further information about this family?)
